I am concerned about the current welfare of middle school teacher Abdulla Jamal, arrested in April 2005 in the Xinjiang Uighur Autonomous Region, after he submitted to a Kashgar publishing house the manuscript of his book, *Disaster in the Oil Well*. Apparently detained solely for exercising his right to freedom of expression, he should be released immediately and unconditionally, unless he is to be charged with a recognizably criminal offense.

Meanwhile, I seek assurances that he is being protected from torture & ill-treatment while he is in custody, and that he has access to lawyers, family, and medical treatment.
